- Failure of child care to thrive in 'child welfare/ protection' (or other) ministry








International Public Spending


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International Accessibility


BC's on-going child care crisis


- High fees

The implementation in BC of full school day K for 5 year olds and promise of 'pre-K' for 3 and 4 year olds

To date - no strategy to recognize and include existing early care and learning services or meet the needs of all families

International and national trend of growing role for ministries of education in early learning


International policy lessons suggest:

- Integrate of care and learning under one lead ministry
- Where integration pursued home in Education most effective
- Strong and equal partnership between care and learning sectors required

Strong Family Policy – time and resources

Provincial and federal responsibilities

First Nations and Aboriginal Communities Control

New investment - adequate and stable budget

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Highlights of the Community Plan

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1. New Early Care and Learning Act

Legislates rights of:

- All young children to access services that respect their unique developmental stage
- Families, particularly those in the paid labour force, to quality, affordable care and learning that meets their needs (on a voluntary basis)
- First Nations control over their own services

Also...

Protects against 'schoolification' Supports child care sector to be strong & equal partner

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2. New Home in Ministry of Education

For all community & school-based early care & learning programs

Ministry of Education offers

- Universality
- Public funding
- Democratic control
- Public understanding and support
- Respect and fair compensation
- Infrastructure to deliver





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3. New Early Care & Learning Plans

Boards of Education mandated & funded to locally govern new Act and local Early Care and Learning Services

- Develop and implement EC&L Plan
- Dedicate staff to support EC&L
- Establish standing and staffed EC&L Committees
- Ensure appropriate facilities on or off school sites





4. New Early Years Centre Networks

- Alternative, more appropriate than 'pre K'
- Integrate and evolve from existing licensed child care into neighbourhood EYC Networks.
- Boards of Education responsible for developing and delivering all new EYC Networks.

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4. New EYC Networks

- Staffed by qualified ECEs in community unless appropriate space is available in or on school grounds
- Support for existing providers through application process to become EYC network
- EYC Networks key players in coordinated Early Childhood Services
- Providers can remain independent meet licensing requirements – but no public funds tied to new accountability measures

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4. New EYC Networks

Funding tied to accountability measures

- Cap parent fees at affordable levels
- Meet improved wage and training levels
- Include ALL children
- Meet identified community need
- Program consistent with Early Learning Framework

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5. Enhance Kindergarten/Grade 1 School entry at age 5

Enhance Kindergarten ECEs work with teachers to

- Lower ratio
- Cover full working day/year
- Bring ECE practice into schools

Enhance Grade 1 with same approach





5. School Age Care - Grade 2 and up

- Boards of Education assume full responsibility for school age care
- Existing school age child care providers integrated into system with same accountability measures
- New programs developed & delivered by Boards of Education

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6. Workforce Development

Enhance quality

Respect expertise of Early Childhood Educators Move towards parity with teachers

Bachelor of Early Childhood Education as new educational standard for sector

Diploma as minimum for group, family & school age care.

Support sector to upgrade their education

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Implementation

- 1. Commitment to embrace and implement the Plan
- 2. Enact the Early Care and Learning Act
- 3. Develop a 5 year stable budget

4. Develop ELC Plans - priority on programs that meet the needs of working families

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Questions remain BUT

Change is here.

The status quo is not an acceptable fall back.

Integration of Care & Learning is a PROCESS.

Plans are NOT guarantees.

EC&L community needs to be included in change.
