She is chair of the City's Planning, Transportation, and Environment Committee and of the Metro Vancouver Parks Committee. Outside City Hall, Heather is a biologist, singer, cyclist, and avid camper. Heather

will speak about how local policies compare with the basic tenets of one of the world's biggest experiments in city planning, public art, and community building: Burning Man.



DAVID FRISCH was elected City of Courtenay councillor in 2014. His vision for the future is to continue building the coolest city on Vancouver Island. David learned his love of the outdoors growing up in North Bay, Ontario, and his distaste for urban sprawl in southern Ontario. He strives to live his message by limiting the use of his private automobiles

and supporting his local economy. David lives in Courtenay with his partner, Chantal, and their three children.



SHERESE JOHNSON is a co-founder of Change from Inside, a consulting group that leverages communication and education initiatives to develop socially responsible and environmentally sustainable practices inside organizations. Over the past 10 years she has worked with corporate energy efficiency leaders, First Nations communities,

government, and nonprofit organizations, including BC Hydro, Honeywell, the Forest Products Association of Canada, and the BC Co-operative Association.



PETER LUCKHAM has lived on Thetis Island for 28 years. His neighbours proposed he run for the Island Trust in 2006. "Seemed like a good idea at the time" he said; four elections later he still thinks so. He did all the usual Island things, built a house, raised a family and has commuted to work for

28 years. An avid scuba diver with more than 1,000 dives in the Salish Sea, he has a deep interest in the marine environment. Peter has been a vice chair with the Trust for six years and this term was elected by Trust Council to serve as chair.



GREG MOORE is an avid transit user and bike rider and is often seen peddling around town getting from one place to another (thank goodness Port Coquitlam is flat for the most part!). He loves taking morning walks with his wife Erin and their dog Molly in his neighbourhood and around their

community. Greg is well known for being a practical joker and has a great sense of humour; you can often hear his laughter permeating from somewhere within City Hall. He gives back to the community in many more ways outside of being the mayor of Port Coquitlam.

SOLUTIONS FOR ONE PLANET LIVING

Action on climate change is more important than ever. Leadership is needed in tackling environmental and sustainability issues in our communities for future generations, and local leaders can affect a substantive difference. BILL REES will talk about the big ecological footprint picture and sustainable degrowth and relocalizing the economy, and JENNIE MOORE will present her findings on One Planet Living in Vancouver.



WILLIAM REES is a human

ecologist, ecological economist, former director and professor emeritus of UBC's School of Community and Regional Planning. His research focuses on the global environmental trends and the ecological requirements

for sustainable development. Best known as the originator of 'ecological footprint analysis', Prof. Rees has authored over 150 peer-reviewed and numerous popular articles on sustainability policy (or lack thereof). He is a fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and was awarded both the Boulding Prize in Ecological Economics and a Blue Planet Prize (jointly with Dr. Mathis Wackernagel) in 2012. In 2014, Dr. Rees was elected a full member of the Club of Rome.



JENNIE MOORE is Director. Sustainable Development and Environmental Stewardship at the BC Institute of Technology. She helps instructors develop new curriculum to respond to the emerging green economy. She has extensive

experience in the realm of ecological sustainability and urban systems, including climate change and energy management, green buildings, and eco-industrial networking. Prior to joining BCIT she worked for over a decade at Metro Vancouver where she inspired the Sustainable Region Initiative and served as Manager of Strategic Initiatives. Jennie is a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Accredited Professional and completed a PhD in Planning at UBC. Her research explores the potential for Vancouver to achieve one-planet living. Jennie is a senior associate of the One Earth Initiative and a core advisor to the International Ecocity Framework and Standards.

JIM ABRAM moved to Canada in 1969 in protest of the Vietnam war and became a citizen in 1977. Continuously elected in local government since 1988, he served on the UBCM executive for 10 years, including as president. Jim is immersed in the fight to put BC Ferries back into the Highways system as it is our Marine Highway.



AARON EKMAN was elected Secretary-Treasurer of the BC Federation of Labour in 2014. Aaron was previously Northern Regional Coordinator with BCGEU in Prince George. Aaron first became active in the student union movement, was the first chair of the VDLC's Young Workers' Committee, and was founding president of the North Central Labour

Council. He has a long history of progressive political campaigning at the local, provincial and federal government levels.



KEITH REYNOLDS is a national research representative at CUPE. His work currently focuses on privatization and municipal issues. Keith is on the national executive of the CCPA, vice chair and treasurer of CCPA–BC, and on the board of the BC Freedom of Information and Privacy Association. He lives in the District of North Vancouver where he has chaired

municipal advisory committees on budget, finance and community services.



MIKE RUTTAN was born and raised in the Alberni Valley. He attended UBC and SFU, and completed a Masters of Education Administration at the University of Victoria. Mike's teaching career spanned three decades, highlighted with six years as principal of Alberni District Secondary School, where he is most proud of his work creating a culture that was

consultative, respectful, and inclusive. Mike and his wife Bonnie reside in Port Alberni and have four grown children.



DEREK CORRIGAN has been a Burnaby resident since 1977 and had the pleasure of serving the citizens of Burnaby since elected to Burnaby City Council as a councillor in 1987. He was elected Mayor in 2002, and re-elected in 2005, 2008, 2011 and 2014. This year marks his twenty-eighth consecutive year as a member of Burnaby Council,

where he strives to bring the history and heritage of his two decades of public service to every important decision.

winning author of 100-plus articles and seven books including *The* Environmental Rights Revolution: A Global Study of Constitutions, Human Rights, and the Environment and *The Right to a Healthy* Environment: Revitalizing Canada's Constitution.
